History

Year 8

Year 8 pupils have been studying Public Health during the Victorian period and have been choosing their 'Hero of Public Health'. The candidates were Edwin Chadwick, John Snow, Joseph Bazalgette, Florence Nightingale and Mary Seacole.

Here are the thoughts of two Year 8 pupils:

My hero is Florence Nightingale because she helped improve hygiene and health the most out of all the candidates. She saved lots of soldiers' lives during the Crimean War by completely reorganising the way that soldiers were cared for and improving the standard of the military hospitals. (Alfie D)

My hero is John Snow because he discovered that cholera was a waterborne disease and thus saved many lives. He created a map indicating where people had died from cholera and used this information to remove the handle from the water pump. His theory had been proved correct. (Ryan I)

Year 9

To complement their understanding of the Holocaust, Year 9 history pupils have read extracts from the award-winning true story 'Hana's Suitcase'. The suitcase in question belonged to Hana Brady, a Czech Jew who died in Auschwitz. The suitcase inspired the director of a Holocaust museum in Japan, Fumiko Ishioka to research Hana's life and use her story to educate future generations about the horror of the Holocaust.

Below are some extracts from pupil work on the Holocaust, inspired by the reading of Hana's Suitcase:

Hana lived in Nove Mesto with her family who were Jewish. When the Nazis invaded Czechoslovakia, Hana's mother and father were taken to concentration camps. The Nuremberg laws got worse and Jews were not allowed to go anywhere and were brutally discriminated against. After Hana and her brother went to stay with their aunt and uncle they had to be taken to Theresienstadt, a concentration camp made to look better than it was for propagand purposes. (Macy H)

Hitler moved the Jews to ghettos to separate them from the Germans because he believed they were unnatural. The ghettos were designed and used to dehumanise Jews, so that people did not feel sympathy for them. This allowed Hitler to proceed with the final stage of the Holocaust, taking Jews to concentration camps and exterminating them. (Amy T)

Raising environmental and sustainable awareness

On Tuesday the 24th May, a range of pupils from Year 7 to Year 9 were given the opportunity to attend the Knowsley Youth Business Festival where a variety of speakers spoke about our environmental future and sustainable living.

The festival encouraged small changes in our human habits, which can make vital differences in our society. Our first speakers were 2 members of a youth environmental awareness group, who discussed the importance of young people raising awareness in and around our society.

Later in the session, there was a talk from Ian Solomon-Kawall who is the co-founder of Permaculture Garden and the Hip hop garden. Ian has created amazing urban areas of wellbeing and gardening as a legacy and remembrance for his late mother. Drawing from his own experience Ian described how creating something sustainable and easily manageable really helped and raise his own mental health. A rather unique way to spread his word about environmental awareness is via the art of Rap and Hip hop.

To cap off an amazing event, the festival was hosted by the amazing TV naturalist and environmental campaigner Chris Packham. Chris had talked about the importance of environmentalism to him and how it has shaped his life and work.

The whole day was an incredible experience and raised a lot of questions about how we can do little things in our own lives, but has a positive environmental impact!

Each one of our pupils was exemplary and got involved in asking questions or took part in activities throughout the day!

Thank you to the pupils for making it such a memorable experience for myself and I hope to run another trip for the new Year 10 next year – so look out for information from me in due course.

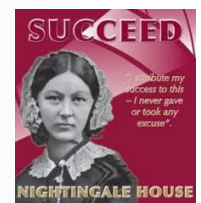
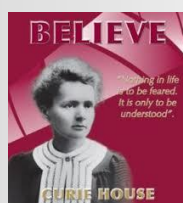
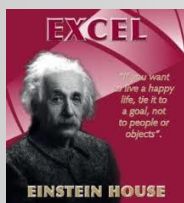
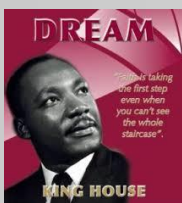
