Dear Parent/Carer

It has been an enjoyable and aspirational week at LDA.

Year 9 Football Match Report



This half-term Lord Derby Academy is delighted to launch our form time reading initiative, 'Ready to Read.' As you will be aware, our form time has extended by 10 minutes and in order to maximise this time, we have dedicated it to a shared reading experience in form groups.

What is Ready to Read?

Quite simply: four out of five mornings, during form time, your child's form tutor will read aloud to their form class for 15 minutes of the session. Pupils will have their own copy to follow along.


What will they be reading?

Year 7 Trash charts the story of three poor boys who live in shanty towns on a dumpsite in the Philippines and their journey of discovering something they wish would


have never happened.



Ghost Boys follows the events and aftermath of the murder of a black twelve-year old boy who is shot dead by a white police officer before returning as a ghost.



The Crossing is a verse novel about two teenagers from opposite worlds and different problems who meet through swimming.



Pigeon English tells the story of an eleven-year old's journey from Ghana to a complex apartment block



in an area of London plagued by murder and violence.

Why have we selected these novels?

Our selection comprises of high-quality, award winning literature with an array of engaging storylines and characters that will certainly engage our pupils-and teachers! All of the novels are age appropriate and explore issues and themes that will both resonate with pupils as well as taking them beyond the realms of their own lived experience. The novels also cover similar themes to those covered in PSHE and our form time Personal Development Curriculum, allowing pupils to further consolidate their knowledge in this area and discuss the thought provoking concepts that arise. Some of the challenging concepts the books explore include: poverty, homelessness, corruption, racism, income disparity, violence and waste.

Why are we introducing 'Ready to Read?'

The benefits of reading regularly have been well publicised: a pupil who reads for 20 minutes each day will be exposed to 1, 800,000 words in a year compared to a pupil who only reads for 1 minute a day who will be only exposed to 8,000 new words a year. Sadly, this huge deficit will not only be reflected in external examination performance, but also in their ability to articulate thoughts and ideas, and to access the demanding literature required to be productive, independent members of society. Reading confers all sorts of intellectual advantages: the more you read the more intelligent you will become. However, in spite of this, the number of teenagers reading is at alltime low and it can often be a struggle to enthuse our teenagers to read often and widely for pleasure; many claim 'to hate reading.' Yet, everyone loves stories! The benefit of the teacher reading aloud to pupils is that it will allow those who struggle to read silently and process information independently to access challenging, exciting content. We cannot wait to get started and would love for you to ask your child about what they are reading. Many thanks for your support of this exciting programme.
